#### **Sustaining Sports within school beyond Sports Premium Funding:**

Leaders of the school place high priority on sport and physical activity. PE, Games and Health related activities are well-embedded within the curriculum. This high status would not diminish with a reduction in funding. Staff and TAs have been trained to lead a range of sporting activities and these skills are now well embedded. Capacity is strong to continue to deliver these. Furthermore, good links have been made with other local schools and clubs so that competitions could still take place, as well as, in-house led activities. The school has the capacity to continue to deliver playground activity training from within its own staff. This will enable lunchtime and playtime activities to continue to be developed and new staff and pupils to be trained effectively. Capacity has also been built with staff being trained in delivering 'Real PE' and this could be cascaded to any new staff in-house. Our PE leader has worked with the Bracknell Schools Sports Partnership to develop her expertise and continue the work within school. The Gold Games Mark is recognition of sustained high performance in this area.
