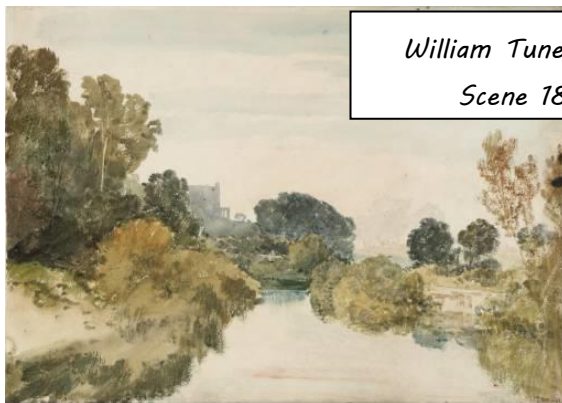


Year 6 Paintina - Watercolour and Acrylic

| Important Facts and Key vocabulary | |
|------------------------------------|--|
| Watercolour | A solid or liquid paint that is to be used watered down and layered |
| Acrylic | A thick heavy paint that can be used smoothly or to create texture. |
| William Turner | Joseph Mallord William Turner RA, known contemporarily as William Turner, was an English Romantic painter, printmaker and watercolourist. He is known for his expressive colourisations, imaginative landscapes and turbulent, often violent marine paintings. |
| Modern Artist | People call Turner the first modern artist because his messy, expressive style and bright colours influenced lots of modern artists. Many of his later artworks look like impressionist paintings |

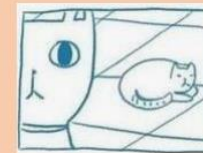
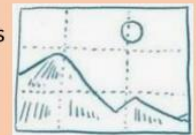
Prior Learning:

The children will have used watercolours in previous year groups. They have experimented with mixing primary and secondary colours to vary tones. They have also experimented with water content in their art pieces.



Composition Layouts

Rule of thirds – Place focal objects at 1/3 or 2/3 of the image horizontally or vertically. Not in the middle



Balance elements. If there is an emphasis on one side balance it out with smaller objects on the other

Simplify and fill. Enlarge or crop the image to fill the space



Use lines. Lines will draw the viewer in, they don't have to be straight, consider S or C
