

Key Vocabulary	
<b>Continent</b>	A continent is a massive area of land that is separated from other areas of land by water or natural features.
<b>Country</b>	An area of land controlled by a government. There may be many countries in one continent.
<b>Island</b>	An island is an area of land smaller than a continent that is entirely surrounded by water.
<b>City</b>	A large town.
<b>Town</b>	A built-up area with a name, defined boundaries, and local government, that is larger than a village and generally smaller than a city.
<b>Village</b>	A group of houses and associated buildings, larger than a hamlet and smaller than a town, situated in a rural area.
<b>Hamlet</b>	A small settlement, generally one smaller than a village.
<b>County</b>	A territorial division of some countries. Example: Are you going to the Berkshire county fair?
<b>Physical features</b>	Something which is <b>natural</b> – it occurs naturally in nature. E.g. land, water within a land, soil, trees and
<b>Human features</b>	Something man-made / made by a <b>human</b> being. E.g. Buildings, roads and houses.
<b>Contour lines</b>	A <b>contour line</b> joins points of equal elevation (height) above a given level, such as sea level. A <b>contour map</b> is a map illustrated with <b>contour lines</b> , which shows valleys and hills, and the steepness or gentleness of slopes.
